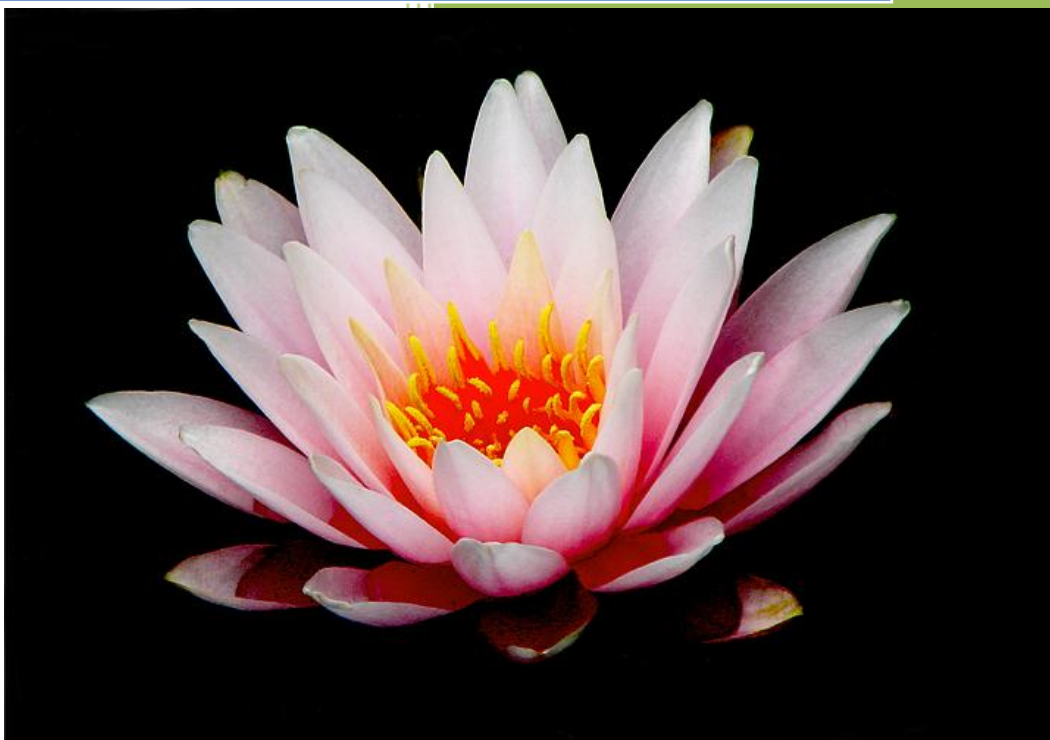

The Beginning of My Year of the Dragon

Chinese people have a special zodiac system that is based on twelve animals: Rat(鼠)、Ox(牛)、Tiger(虎)、Rabbit(兔)、Dragon(龙)、Snake(蛇)、Horse(马)、Ram(羊)、Monkey(猴)、Rooster(鸡)、Dog(狗), and Pig(猪). According to this zodiac system, 2012 is the year of the Dragon.

In Chinese astrology, the dragon holds special significance. The Chinese dragon is not seen as a threatening evil being as it is often perceived by people in the west. In Chinese culture, the dragon is a symbol of power, superiority and rule. In China, there are many sculptures and carvings of dragons. Chinese call themselves the descendants of the Dragon. Many married couples would like to have baby in the Year of Dragon. This year, the Chinese New Year began on January 23, 2012. Chinese New Year, also called the Spring Festival, is the largest and most important holiday in China. It is celebrated for 15 days. Today, people in China enjoy a seven day holiday vacation for the Chinese New Year. I really miss that. Traditionally, a reunion dinner is held on New Year's Eve where members of the family from near and far, get together for celebration. The New Year's Eve dinner is a very large and multi-course banquet. After dinner, people will watch the National New Year Celebration Gala on TV, or play games and socialize. They stay late on New Year's Eve and get up late on New Year's Day.

Since coming to the United States, I have lost the privilege of having time off of work for Chinese New Year, unless the Chinese New Year happens to fall on the weekend. Therefore, I normally will take a day off on the Chinese New Year Day, if possible. This year I took Monday, Jan. 23 off. However, this year, I didn't get to stay up late on New Year's Eve or sleep late on New Year's Day. Instead I did the opposite: I went to bed early (9:00 pm) on New Year's Eve and got up early (4:00 am) on New Year's Day. A local TV station, WNWO, invited CAGT to perform a traditional Chinese dance on their Today show to celebrate the Chinese New Year. We were asked to be the TV station around 5:30 am!

I arrived at the TV studio with three other dancers, Ming Chen, Ying Li, and Yanfang Xue. Ying's husband, Jiakai Li went along as our photographer. Our group performed an umbrella folk dance to share our joy and the Chinese culture with the local community. We had a great time and enjoyed it very much.



Anyway, this year I had a very unusual, but meaningful and enjoyable beginning of the Chinese New Year.

Toledo Families Adapt Children from China

In the past 15 years, American families have adopted almost seventy thousand children born in China, and there are more than 100 such families in the greater Toledo area. Seven years ago, a local chapter of an international support group called Families with Children from China (FCC) was formed in Toledo. These families are bound together by a common desire



to celebrate their children's Chinese heritage while exploring issues that might be present in a trans-cultural family. In the past fifteen years, the international adoption of Chinese children has risen in number for two main reasons. First, due to government regulations in response to an ever-increasing population in China, nearly one million children, most of them girls, are abandoned each year. Second, more and more American families are choosing to adopt from overseas in a desire to build their families.

Most of the meetings of Families with Children from China-Toledo Chapter (FCC-Toledo) are purely social. The group celebrates Chinese New Year and other popular holidays, and lets the children get together just to play and spend time with other families who share their

background. The educational seminars that the group attends focus on topics facing all adoptive families, as well as specialize in issues that the FCC children may encounter as Asian children growing up in Caucasian families.
